TRANSCRIPT

Located in the Black Hills of South Dakota, Mount Rushmore is a monumental sculpture carved into the side of a mountain depicting four of the most famous and influential presidents in the history of the United States of America (0): George Washington, Thomas Jefferson, Abraham Lincoln and Theodore Roosevelt.

The idea for the sculpture was suggested in 1923 as a way to bring visitors to South Dakota and sculptor Gutzon Borglum was selected to create it. Congress approved the project in 1925 but work didn't begin until October 4th, 1927 (10).

Over the next 14 years, 400 workers blasted more than 400,000 tons of rock off the mountainside using dynamite, finishing the details with jackhammers and chisels. **Despite the dangerous conditions, no-one died during the construction of Mount Rushmore (11).**

The face of George Washington was finished first in 1934, followed by Thomas Jefferson in 1936. Thomas Jefferson had been planned to stand on Washington's right, but when the rock on that side was found to be bad for carving (12), all the carving that had been done was blown off with dynamite and he was moved to the other side. Abraham Lincoln's face was finished in 1937, and Theodore Roosevelt was the last one done in 1939 (13).

Mount Rushmore cost less than one million dollars to complete. Originally the sculptures were supposed to show the presidents down to their waists, but the builders ran out of money and so they just made their heads (14). The heads of the presidents are 60 feet or 18 metres tall -that's the height of a six-storey building! Their eyes are each 11 feet or 3.3 metres across (15) and their noses are 20 feet or 6 metres long.

Today Mount Rushmore is carefully maintained to prevent cracking. Each year trained mountain climbers scale the monument and seal tiny cracks before they can grow and cause parts to break off (16).

Between two and three million people visit Mount Rushmore each year to see the colossal presidents, making it the most popular tourist attraction in South Dakota.

TRANSCRIPT

Newton Abbot is a town that was built on the prosperity of the railway (0) being brought through by Great Western Railways through to this part of the country, and then down on to Cornwall which opened it up. Up to that point people didn't come down here very easily, the travelling was very difficult (17) but in the Victorian period the railway came this far and Newton Abbot was particularly important because they had the big workshops (18) for the maintenance of the railway and their engines and repairs.

And based on that prosperity that the railway brought they built an enormous amount of the houses in the town. So, if you look around the town, on Wilbur Hill for example, you find the very big houses, big gardens (19), room for staff, etc. And then along East Street, which is on the left-hand side, it's on a very steep hill, there are rows and rows of terraced houses there. And some terraced houses are bigger and smarter and they were built for the middle management (20) if you like, and then there are some others that were built more modestly for the workers. And so, in the town you can see the different levels (21) of the work or the earnings and the class of the different people in the different houses. And that's really... most of the building in Newton Abbot was done in that period. We also have a very nice building that was done by someone called Passmore, and it's the local library (22), but it's being used for adult education. That's a very nice building, but generally in the sixties and seventies the centre of town was demolished and rebuilt. We now have the most hideous car park (23) in the centre of the town. I have to say it's awful, but the pedestrian area where the shops (24) are, that's really quite nice now. But it's all been based on the wealth (25) brought by the railways in the Victorian period.
